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IRIS' INSIGHTS



This is my last AORTA article: It's a bittersweet time for me as my Presidential Year draws to a close. I am grateful that there were not many crises and incidents within and outside of the Fraternity. Certainly, the world saw its share of strife in the last year. I share the pride in holding down the fort, tackling challenges and amidst many happy moments close to home that brought glimpses of hope to our lives. Whether you understand Hebrew or not, I will explain that my maiden name is Kivity. In Hebrew, Kivity, means "I hoped". Serendipitously my late father, Josef Kivity z"l, and two of his brothers (altogether 7 siblings) chose this name upon emigration from Irag to Israel around 1951. Their original surname, Kuwaiti, was a bit of a mystery that was finally understood to be an "acquired" surname when my father's grandfather made his way from Kuwait to Iraq. My great grandfather may have been Abraham Abraham, but he acquired the name Kuwaiti, or Beit Kuwaiti, House of Kuwait, when he settled in Basra, Iragi in the 1800's. Funny enough, the first man known to have embraced monotheism was Abraham. Abraham, our Patriarch from Biblical days, came from Ur-Kasdim, which is now part of modern-day Iraq.

Back to my father. When my father arrived in Israel, he, and my Uncles Anwar and Salekh (Tzvi) changed their last name to Kivity. My father chose his name well since it suited his humble, mild-mannered, and regal personality. Like the fledgling country, absorbing more and more of its people from Arab nations so that they could build better lives, my father always looked to the future with hope. My father was born in 1921 and in 1951 was a graduated pharmacist who had to lock up and abandon two wellstocked pharmacies and a pharmaceutical warehouse when all assets were seized by the Iraqi government. But there was no looking back. He was the last family member to be left in Iraq as he waited for an opportunity to leave. When he was summoned for questioning by the police, he collected his last belongings, bribed the right people, and managed to escape from Iraq. The rest is for another article.

So, why did I choose to pay homage to my father? It is from him that I learned patience and perseverance. I may not as capable as him to take huge chances and forge forward, yet it has been my life goal to emulate him in not looking back and lamenting on what was lost and what could have been. All of us could have moments of regrets and rumination, however we know that we need to seek and engage in the present and prepare for the future with hope and action energetically and intentionally.

That, staying present while also looking forward, is how I have seen my role on the Line and ultimately the Presidency (with a capital P). That is how so many in our Fraternity see themselves as they hold positions in the many Committees that make up our great Fraternity. We are part of a legacy brought forth by individuals who HOPED to make a future for Jewish dentists. Well before the devastation of the Holocaust, we were segregated and persecuted. Individually, we may hardly feel it now, but anti-Semitism is amongst us and the number of anti-Semitic incidents is on the rise. As part of my Presidency, I rallied to raise awareness of our collective role in keeping our eyes and ears open to fighting racism and anti-Semitism. Now Alpha Omega Dental Fraternity, here and in other locations, is open and welcoming to more than Jewish dentists. We are open to all who wish to be part of the great work that we do. We have fun, we have CE, we eat (real food in a virtual forum) and we help each other like a great "functional" family does.

In the first paragraph above, I said that I share the pride in running the Fraternity for this year. Each of the Line Officers who preceded by ascent to the Presidency and each of the current

FROM THE EDITOR








This is a photo of the Belzec death camp in Poland. Jews met their death within hours of arrival. There were no known survivors from this death camp. Few people know of Belzec.

AO Revival Bookclub Author Series on Wed March 31st, 2021 with Ellen Schwartz.





We had the absolute pleasure and privilege to hear Ellen Schwartz speak about her life and lessons learned, her two books and her philanthropy on Wed March 31st, 2021 at 7:30 pm on Zoom. This event was open to AO members and their families and friends. All proceeds from this event were donated to Project Give Back, a charity that Ellen founded that teaches empathy and philanthropy to grade 4 students in the public, private and parochial schools in and around Toronto. We had 49 people registered for this event on Zoom. Tickets for AO members and their families were \$20.00 per computer and all quests were \$25.00. We were able to raise \$1,045.00 for her charity.

Ellen is an elementary teacher, community leader, author and public speaker. As founder of Project Give Back she links her decades of teaching with her personal passion for charitable causes. She co-founded Jacob's Ladder, Canadian Foundation for the Control of Neurodegenerative Disease. Jacob's Ladder raised over three million dollars towards research, education, awareness and therapy into neurodegenerative illnesses.

Ellen's first born son Jacob was born with a rare, fatal, congenital neurodegenerative illness called Canavan Disease that left him unable to walk, talk, see or eat. Doctors told her and her husband that Jacob would not live past his fourth birthday and was on borrowed time. Jacob lived until his 21st birthday.

Ellen has written two books about her journey and her new found outlook on life- Lessons from Jacob: A Disabled Son Teaches His Mother About Courage, Hope and the Joy of Living Life to the Fullest and Without One Word Spoken. Without One Word Spoken rated a National Best Seller by the Globe and Mail.





Ellen has been honored by the Israel Cancer Research Fund, Ve'ahavta, Aish Toronto, Sick Kids Hospital and Brilliant Minded Women. She was awarded a Queen's Jubilee medal, the Meritorious Service Decoration by the Governor General of Canada, and a Canada 150 Exemplary Canadian medal.

I have had the honour of knowing Ellen for the past 22 years. She is a true ray of sunshine, emits beautiful and positive energy even at times when others would not be able to do so, and is a pillar in the community. She has always strived to give back in the most generous of ways. I was lucky enough to sit on the Jacob's Ladder board from just past inception to the Fall of 2019 when it was dissolved.

It was such a pleasure and a treat to have the opportunity for Ellen to share her wisdom with Alpha Omega. She is a true inspiration to all who know her and a beautiful human being. WHY O WHY



Most readers of Aorta completed an undergraduate dental education and during those years encountered three types of educators. If you were fortunate, you experienced a few who were charismatic and devoted to sharing the intricacies of a profession that they obviously loved. They treated students fairly, stimulated enquiry and most importantly provided a moral and ethical role model. Even if you did not experience these exceptional teachers, most full-time and part-time instructors were skilled, engaged in the task and obviously doing their best to provide a quality education. However, you may also have been exposed to a few teachers who could only be described as mean-spirited and who lacked any degree of empathy for the student struggling to learn difficult clinical procedures and patient management. These problematic instructors may just have been irascible types (who did not belong in a teaching environment) or they had personal insecurities exposed when confronted by a questioning student. In either case, until the 1980's or so, these teachers survived and sometimes flourished simply because students did not ask questions for fear of the consequences. As a student, you did exactly as you were told. Like it or leave it.

In the 1990's, the healing arts professions were exploring and implementing evidencebased clinical management. Clinical practice guidelines based on systematic reviews of the literature were finding their way into practice. What we did not know was being exposed and what we thought worked was often found to be flawed. Academia and regulatory organizations, always a bit slow to change, were not at the forefront of this new wave.

I remember attending a symposium which addressed the application of evidence-based concepts in dental education. I was asked to contribute to a discussion of potential conflicts with teachers. After 20 minutes expounding on the topics of training, understanding levels of evidence, using reference sources and similar matters, I suggested that it might take a generation of teachers to make the shift. I sensed a level of unease from the audience. I continued; dentists, whether they are clinicians or academics, regard themselves as content experts. They are decision-makers and develop or rely on techniques which yield predictable outcomes. These routines become engrained and contribute to the clinician's professional confidence. Change does not come easily because the gold standard is the dentist's personal choice of clinical intervention. But what if evidence shows that what one has been doing or teaching, does not provide the best outcome or has less than full-some scientific support? To suggest that academics and clinicians will immediately adopt clinical guidelines that differ from their innate experience is a pipe dream. I concluded my talk and returned to my seat noticing what can only be described as a perfunctory bit of applause. A colleague sitting next to me leaned over and whispered, "you must have hit a nerve."

Returning to our discussion of teachers, let me suggest, that the mean-spirited irascible teachers are mostly gone, but in their place are some who find difficulty in accepting evidence which does not support their personal views and who express their objections in their interaction with students. Often, students are left in a quandary as to who or what to believe. To demonstrate this pedagogical dilemma, I will present three short tales, each has the question 'why' at its core. These examples, taken from the radiology clinic, are compilations of numerous interactions I have had with students and I assure you it occurs across the entire clinical spectrum.

Sarah has brought a panoramic radiograph to the radiology reading room for assessment. She provides a clinical summary: The patient is eight years old, new to the school, normal in all respects, dental development is within the range of normal, there are no signs or symptoms of oral facial disease. The instructor asks Sarah to take bitewing and panoramic radiographs. Sarah, remembering her recent lecture 'Guidelines for Diagnostic Radiology' wonders what the justification for the Pan was and asks the question 'Why?' The instructor provides his answer. The patient has never had a Pan and in his practice, he takes one for all 8-year-olds to assess dental development even when there is no clinical indication. Sarah is confused. She knows that not having a radiograph is not justification for taking one and that radiography should not be used to validate normal growth and development. I had to support Sarah who was correct in her assessment of the justification for the Pan. However, I offered the possibility that the instructor might have had something in mind but did not convey it to Sarah and therefore both Sarah and I failed to learn anything in the process, let alone the patient who might have been unnecessarily exposed.

Mike was assigned a 65-year-old male who came to the school requesting new complete dentures. The patient had been edentulous since the age of 35 and had worn complete dentures since that time. At 45 he had a second pair made which he used without complaint. These dentures had worn posterior teeth, been relined once, and repaired twice and the plastic bases had discoloured. He wished to have a new set made. Clinical exam revealed no soft or hard tissue abnormalities. The instructor ordered a Pan. Mike asked 'Why?' The instructor said, "Because that is what I do in my office." Mike pressed on; "I really don't see the need". The instructor answered, "You always have to protect yourself from lawsuits".

Carl brought a Pan of a 12- year-old girl who was being evaluated for orthodontic treatment. Carl did a thorough review which was correct in all aspects except one. I asked Carl why he did not notice the congenitally missing mandibular incisor? Carl was a bit shocked. I said I would not mark him down if he answered my question correctly. Why did I find the missing tooth and he did not? Carl looking a bit befuddled blurted out that I must be smarter than him. I said that was the wrong answer. The correct answer was- I counted teeth. I told him that I count teeth for every new patient, and he might consider doing the same. The story continues; about 10 years later, I was reading my newspaper at Union Station waiting for my train to London. I heard someone call out "Dr. Kogon, is that you?" It was Carl. He was waiting for his track to be called for his GoTrain commute. He sat down beside me, and we exchanged pleasantries. Then, unexpectedly, he asked if I had ever won the annual teaching award. I said, "No." "It doesn't surprise me" he said. "You were a good teacher, but you pissed off a lot of students." "How so?" I asked, not too anxious for a response. Carl related that I often asked 'Why' questions in my lectures and clinics. Questions which were not specifically related to the subject. Why is an understanding of histology important? Why did your 28-year-old patient come to the clinic with his mother? Why did the patient's pain disappear? Why did your patient seek care after 25 years of neglect? Students were uncomfortable not being able to answer or discuss material which seemed off topic. Although you were often nominated, you were not widely supported. When you suggested that I should count to 32 for every patient, I thought you were putting me down, so I also voted against you.

Thankfully, Carl's train was called. Before he left, he said. "I count teeth for every new patient and over the years I have found more than a few interesting diagnoses and once corrected an orthodontist. As far as your lectures were concerned, you pissed me off as well, but now I understand that Dentistry is not neatly divided into chunks, everything counts. Glad to have seen you" He shook my hand and raced off. I tell this story not for any self-aggrandizement but to emphasize that teachers as well as students should never retreat from asking the 'Why' question.

In the last two decades there has been an obvious change in the ethnic diversity of both the dental class and the teaching faculty. Many students derive from cultures which hold professors in high esteem and relegate the student to passive receptors of knowledge. Students will not ask 'why' questions because it is considered an affront to the professorial status of the teacher. In addition, I am aware of some members of the faculty who are offended if a student challenges the formal professor/student relationship. These are not easy behaviors to change. I have told these students that they are paying a great deal of money for the right to ask one question - why? And if the question provokes a negative response from the teacher, it is the teacher's issue not theirs.

I realize that eliminating this cultural barrier to education is easier said than done. I will predict, just as I suggested that accepting clinical guidelines may take more than a generation of teachers, this reluctance to ask and answer why guestions may do the same.



And what we saw at DVI THIS WEEK was Dr. Palmon treating a suffering elderly Muslim patient, Bakrya Dajani, with care and compassion.

Bakrya is an eighty-year-old Arab resident of the Hod Nursing Home in Jerusalem. She had been hospitalized recently, and during this time her dentures were lost. She was accompanied to DVI by her nephew, who also served as her interpreter. Although married, she never had any children and her nephew does his best to help whenever possible. Bakrya's husband is blind and completely homebound and cannot be accommodated in the nursing home with her. Bakrya is now confined to a wheelchair because of wounds on her feet.

Being completely toothless, Bakrya's overall health has suffered significantly as she cannot eat any solid foods. Her speech is severely impaired and her overall situation is quite difficult. She is very much looking forward to eventually receiving new dentures and enjoying the "small things in life" like eating and speaking once again.
