THE RAMBAM UNDERGROUND HOSPITAL

Benjamin (Benji) Brown, a lone soldier in the Israel Defense Forces from Toronto, was stationed at Har Dov on Israel's northern border. On July 24th a missile launched by Hezbollah in Lebanon struck the army base, and he sustained a life-threatening injury. After being airlifted to Rambam Health Care Campus (Rambam) in Haifa, and following multiple surgeries, he was being treated in the Neurosurgery ICU when on September 22nd he and all the hospital's 900 patients, staff and equipment were moved to the minus 3 level of the hospital's parking garage where the infrastructure for the entire hospital, including operating rooms, had been pre-planned for use during war. The uniqueness of this facilty attracted news outlets from around the world, including the CBC. During his tour of the hospital CBC reporter Chis Brown interviewed Benji's parents for a special news segment.

AO FOUNDATION OF CANADA

I am reaching the final few weeks serving as President of the Alpha Omega Foundation of Canada. The Foundation is the charitable arm of Alpha Omega and it supports dental research through grants, various worthy organizations that require our donations, funds for dental schools in Israel and Canada, and prizes to AO students who demonstrate academic excellence as well as community involvement and leadership skills.

When I think of what this time has meant to me, two very significant changes happened. The first was as a result of October 7, 2023. The horrendous attack on Israel prompted the establishment of the Emergency Aid to Israel Fund. We created a dropdown for anyone making a donation to the Foundation to direct the amount to the Emergency Aid to Israel. We have given the funds raised to Magen David Adom and Hatzolah. That fund is still available, and funds will continue to be directed to important needs in Israel.

The second is that we have joined efforts of Alpha Omega Foundations in the US, England, Israel, and France in what has been named the International Alliance of Charitable Organizations. Together, we

donated an ambulance in our name to Israel, and are supporting Hebrew University, Tel Aviv University and Rambam Hospital in a program involving dental students and staff who have suffered PTSD either because of treating patients of the recent war in Israel or being called up for duty themselves.

The work done by the Board of Directors of Alpha Omega Foundation of Canada is so meaningful and is what should make every AO member proud that they can contribute to so many deserving recipients. This November, at the next annual meeting, Elliot Goldenberg of Montreal will take over as President of the Foundation. I actually went to dental school with him and know that he will assume the position with enthusiastic energy and wise leadership.

Hug For Hope Israel Family Hosting

Our family hosted an Israeli family from Kibbutz Zikim adjacent to the Zikim Beach. This kibbutz was attacked on October 7 and has suffered from ongoing missile threats for many years. Many Israeli soldiers were slaughtered that day on the nearby army base and nineteen civilians from the beach were killed and or kidnapped that day -1 km from their home.

The kibbutz family came to Toronto with 2 of their children , aged 10 and 14. We met them over zoom 3 times previously to their arrival to help ensure a good match and expectations at both ends. Welcoming a family into a home begins with a leap of faith but ends with a wonderful and meaningful experience for everyone.

The first few days, we watched the family de-stress, gain our trust and bond with us in a calm and reassuring environment. The 10 year old who literally hadn't left his mom's

side since October 7 , was now smiling and playing again.

During the 10 days, we laughed, smiled, cried while our Israeli visitors quickly became part of our family. They also got a taste of cottage life which they absolutely loved ,Toronto by subway, a soccer game, Niagara Falls, Cherry Beach, and the Canadian National Exhibition. The parents got to go on their first date since Oct 7! They also enjoyed free time navigating Toronto on their own.

What made the experience extra special for us and them, is that our own children also embraced our new 'family', along with our siblings, spouses and close friends. Everyone actively participated in the 10 days of activities and gatherings, and showered the family with lots of warmth and love. The kibbutz family also shared their story one evening with a group of our family and

friends to inspire and connect Israelis with Diaspora Jews and to promote the Hug for Hope hosting program.

Overall, the program was an incredible and transformational experience for everyone, bonding with an Israeli family in great need. We provided respite and hope for the future, creating lifelong bonds between our new 'family' and the Diaspora. We are in touch weekly and feel much love on both sides of the world.

Downsizing



There is a point in time when a couple surveys their home and realizes that the square footage is considerably more than what is truly needed to live comfortably. The children are self-sufficient and grandkids are either living too far away or are building their own lives. The extra bedroom, bath, and play area provided by Bubbie and Zaide, are rarely used. Physical factors such as too many stairs, too much landscape or the certainty of imminent expenses for maintenance of roof, furnace, air conditioner, ageing plumbing, and ever-increasing property tax, all grow worrisome. One day they mutter to each other, 'we could be happy in a smaller and newer place.'

At first, the hunt is energized by curiosity. Scan the real estate apps, check out an open house or two. Engage an agent, who shleps you out to properties new and old, at times which are never convenient. Nothing is really good enough. How easily we find fault with things we never took notice of before. Too far north, too far west, no morning sun and the shingles are too brown. The mouldings look cheap and the mortice joints are sloppy. When is the last time you checked out your mouldings? The driveway only holds two cars. What would happen on Pesach when we need space for six. In truth, we have not been home for a Sedar for 10 years. This place feels good except the dishwasher is a brand 'x.' Your cousin had an 'x' and it had to be replaced in 4 years. In today's market it would not be unusual to have the total value of the sale and purchase of two pieces of real estate to exceed two million dollars, yet the cost of a dishwasher which represents a

minute fraction of the total cost, becomes a defining factor. The same can be said about paint colour, a carpet, or a few light fixtures. Although our home had a one car garage, this new place has a double garage but it does seem a bit small. One place was just not going to work because I had nowhere to put my collection of shovels, rakes, garden tools, fertilizer spreader, riding lawn mower and gas tanks. A wholly unimportant issue when you are looking for a stand-alone condominium with property management. Somehow the magnitude of the event blurs the focus of the big picture.

One of the issues when searching for a smaller home is just that; the potential new home is smaller than the one you have grown accustomed to. Going from four bedrooms to three is indeed downsizing, but any three of your current four bedrooms and including the rest of the household furniture, still will not squeeze into your projected new space. The larger the difference in sq. footage and/ or the number of rooms, the more demanding the downsizing becomes. You can take a tape measure to the bedroom dresser and dining room table to assure that they will fit in the new rooms, but you never account for the space taken by three boxes of family albums, the camping gear you last used twentyfive years ago, the year-books from high school, your kids favourite wagon, three old bicycles you promised to repair, rarely used golf clubs, sleds, lawn furniture, forty years worth of plumbing, painting, wallpapering, carpentry, and assorted hardware you used once and can't throw out. I came across a heavy legal box filled to the brim with handwritten lecture notes from my five years of dental studies. Not only were they musty and unreadable, but most of the content was obsolete and in truth I never took a peek at any of it since the day I graduated. That uncalculated hoard must be considered. You must take it with you or dump it. The third option is storage which amounts to expensive procrastination. We got to be on a first name basis with the Goodwill drop off guys and the young man at the dump, who eventually just waived me through.

Every woman who manages a family home has a collection of kitchen, dining and

partying stuff that was put away for special occasions or more often just forgotten. Now that you are moving you must come to grips with assorted pans, serving platters, small appliances, decorations from parties long forgotten, and dozens of odd cups and saucers that come from another era. Why we get personally attached to gadgets hidden away in junk drawers is beyond me. What should you do with five poorly performing meat thermometers? Perhaps your children will take somethings off your hands. It's there for the taking. Our experience, which seems to be the norm - they want nothing. Silverware, art, crystal vases, tea sets and platters, all in pristine condition, have no takers. Auctions, consignment resellers, donations, on-line selling apps, all take time and each come with some degree of aggravation. Take a seat before you are told that the carpets, sofa, and furniture you adore is unwa nted. Moving or downsizing requires that a great deal of stuff gets put into cardboard boxes, sealed, and labelled, awaiting the moving day. No one has a warehouse of boxes of the right size, so you must build an inventory. You can purchase new boxes at an outlandish price for an item which will be used once and discarded, or you can collect used boxes. You transition into a sleuth, checking out supermarket loading docks and Dollarama aisles. Arriving home with three usable cardboard boxes prompts a celebration. Jammed tape dispensers and leaky markers become part of the joy of 'packing up.' Alternatively, you may put on blindfolds, open your billfold, and hire a packing company.

Personal picadilloes are exposed as you begin the packing process. My wife is a neat and tidy person. Everything has its place and there is a place for everything. However, she is incapable of passing by a sale of items which she claims will be needed in the future. Why not get them cheaper when you can? A reasonable concept, but downsizing means that you must move and find a place for hundreds of aluminum cooking trays of a variety of sizes and shapes, enough garbage, freezer, sandwich, storage bags and aluminum foil to supply Costco. We have sufficient Cetaphil moisturizer to soften the skin of an army brigade. More than fifty

years in the same house leads to a lot of redecorating. Painting, wallpaper stripping and hanging, and staining wood, all require tools and leave a collection of partially used cans. I could not trash any which had more than a few drops remaining. You never know when you need a touch-up. I am confronted with cupboards stocked with dozens of cans, some marked but most not, of paint, primer, and stains of various vintage and colours not to mention the array of saved tiles and part rolls of wallpaper. Since moving the stuff is senseless, the problem of disposal in an urban environment becomes an issue that must be addressed. I discovered that my charming spouse is addicted to bags. Not just small plastic grocery bags but any object made by man that could carry anything. We have bags full of beach bags. Bags full of handbags. Bags stuffed with thermos bags for hot and cold stuff. Enough travel bags to satisfy a cruise ship. How do you throw any of this stuff out when she claims that they all will eventually be of use. Over the years, I did almost all the landscaping. We had a half acre that was planted with trees, a vegetable garden, a pond with fish, a perennial garden, assorted bushes, and a lot of grass. All needed water from time to time, so I purchased lengths of hose, sprinklers, hose hangers and reels, hose repair stuff, water pumps, more hoses, fountain spitters and more hoses. With some degree of chagrin, I must admit that I had enough hose to nicely soak BMO field. No one would have noticed until we decided to downsize.

The discovery of objects which were out of mind for decades now require an active act of intervention. We found wedding gifts that were opened once and put away. A box of hundreds of grizzled B&W photos depicting a collection of adults and children who are strangers to me. My mother bequeathed me the box and I do remember that she struggled to identify many of the individuals. Occasionally there is a date on the back of a photograph or an allusion to 'the lake.' Can you get rid of them? Hell no! Somebody may wish to construct a family tree or wonder what late great-uncle, twice removed, Louie, looked like when he was 3 years old.

There is a truth to downsizing. Once gone, ever forgotten (almost). It has been only on rare occasions when we conceded, 'why did we get rid of this or that? The opposite is not an issue. Finding that you transported stuff unnecessarily is easily managed-just find a hiding spot or head for the dump. There is one other truth. The tendency to return to accumulating has to be aggressively restrained. We have now moved to our smaller place, unpacked the boxes, hung

pictures, and filled shelves. Our smaller home is now just the right size. A week ago, Sheila and I went to Canadian Tire to pick up a few items for our 'smaller' patio. As we jockeyed our cart into line, I gazed into the pile of stuff and noticed 6 boxes of aluminum foil, which were on sale, and 25' of a new non-kinking garden hose. Déjà vu.

Though minimum investment amounts and structures can vary greatly from manager to manager, generally speaking investors can invest through a wide range of investment vehicles from investing in a personal name to a corporate entity, as well certain managers

offer the ability to invest through registered plan accounts (i.e. RRSPs, LIRAs, TFSAs etc.).

What role does a real estate private equity firm typically play in the management and operational aspects of an investment?

This can also vary greatly from manager to manager, with active managers taking an active role in the management and operational aspects of each investment, whereas other managers may take a more passive position and simply facilitate the investment. Understanding the structure and positioning of the manger is a key aspect of understanding where and how to invest in real estate private equity.

How does investing in real estate through a private equity firm differ from buying real estate directly?

Though there are many differences, below offers some key points of differentiation:

- Passive investment strategy
- Investing in the "manufacturing of housing" vs direct unit(s) ownership
- Access to large-scale, high-quality projects
- Professional management and expertise in selected markets
- Diversification with low investment access

How do I choose a real estate private equity management company?

When choosing a real estate private equity management company, there are many factors that should be considered, such as their track record, experience, and alignment with your investment goals and risk tolerance. As noted above, understanding the structure of the investment and the role the manger is playing is crucial to understanding the risk you are taking on (for example is the manager actively involved or simply facilitating the investment). Look for firms with a proven history in markets that match your interests, and ensure they provide transparent communication and reporting

on your investment. Finally, assess whether the firm's investment strategy aligns with your preference for involvement and risk management



I am grateful to Avi Wurman who is our Advisor to the Line this year. Avi welcomed me to the Toronto Executive when I moved here in 2006. I had met Avi and Sharon and their family at International events during my dental school years. As you all know, Avi has served as Toronto Chapter president as well as International President – his wealth of knowledge and experience is an incredible asset to us all. I am so looking forward to the year to come with this amazing Line. And of course, I am thankful every day for the expertise of our amazing Executive Administrator, Velarie Mabounsou. We could not do any of this without your attention to detail and support!

I will tell you a bit about myself. I am the oldest of 3 sisters. I grew up in Montreal and attended Solomon Schecter Academy until the end of Grade 6. I then attended The Study – a small girl's school in Montreal. My parents were always very involved in the Montreal Jewish community, and their commitment to these causes taught me from a young age the importance of volunteerism. My father was a leader with the Canadian Friends of the Technion and our Shul, and always encouraged us to take on leadership roles in volunteer organizations. I was the Hillel president in CEGEP and continued my involvement with Hillel throughout my time at McGill. I loved planning events to bring people together and to raise funds and awareness - and I still do! I was the first dentist in my family - which apparently was a dream that my Zaydie had for my father!

Alpha Omega has changed my life in so many ways. I have been a member since I joined the student chapter as a 2nd year dental student at McGill University in the fall of 2002. I was involved throughout dental school in my local student chapter, with the Montreal alumni chapter, and also with AO International.

At Mike Tenenbaum's house in 2002 - I found out what Alpha Omega International is all about - and I was hooked! I attended multiple regional leadership seminars as a student and young alumni over the next few years.

I also attended Convention every year as a dental student (and almost every Convention since then!). In 3rd year, I was elected as International Student Representative and sat on the AO International Board of Directors in that capacity. I was then on the International Board of Directors again as a Young Alumni a few years later. I met Guy Aboodi at Convention in Vancouver in December 2004 - he was a 5th year dental student at Tel Aviv University and was representing his chapter at Convention. Guy and I started a long distance relationship that summer and he moved to Toronto so we could be together after he graduated dental school in Tel Aviv the following year. Guy started the Perio Program at U of T after I graduated ortho, and Guy and I got married in Israel in 2007!

After I completed dental school in 2005, I did a residency year at the Montreal Children's Hospital, and then moved to Toronto for the Orthodontics Program at U of T. The connections Guy and I made through Alpha Omega also helped us tremendously during our speciality programs. Anywhere we travel in the world - we ALWAYS have friends! We have attended multiple conventions with our family. Our kids are now 7, 11 and 14, and they are AO Convention experts! Of course they loved attending our Convention in Toronto, and before that we had an incredible AO Convention experience in Porto. We were hoping to come together with you and your families in Jerusalem - that will have to wait another year but we are planning to be there.

Our kids attend Paul Penna Downtown Jewish Day school, and both Guy and I recently completely separate 2 year terms as Presidents of the Parents' Association of our school. Our eldest daughter Noa just completed Grade 9 at Harbord Collegiate, and she is involved now in the Jewish club at school. This year, more than any other, we have all felt the need to connect to our Jewish community.

We were in Israel on October 7th, and as is with all of you, our lives are forever changed. For me, Alpha Omega is a way for us to connect. It represents me in so many ways - as a Jewish dentist who wants to be a support and leader in my community, and as an advocate for Israel and for Jewish values. I hope AO can provide you with the support and connections you need at this challenging time. If you want to know more about what other AO members are dealing with and doing worldwide, there are many ways to get connected through AO - there is an active What's App group that has members worldwide for example - contact the AO office if you want to join the group.

As the current line of the Toronto AO chapter, we want to ensure that Alpha Omega advocates against anti-semitism in our community. We want our voice to represent what we all stand for. We want to support dental students facing challenges in our Universities - locally and internationally. And we want to ensure all of our members feel safe and supported. My grandparents were Holocaust survivors, and Guy's family survived many challenges as Jews in Iraq. We hope our challenges will be nothing compared to what our ancestors went through.

As a member of Alpha Omega for the past 22 years, I am grateful for all that AO has given to me, and I am so happy to serve as your Toronto chapter president this year. Shana Tova to you and your families and here's to a wonderful AO year!

Introduction of Laurel Linetsky Fleisher

Hi, I'm Mark Ziedenberg and I have been given the distinct honour and privilege of introducing my very special friend, your recipient of the Sheila Rodney Humanitarian Award, Dr. Laurel Linetsky-Fleisher. I have known Laurel for 35 years and from the first time I met her I knew this day would come.

I met Laurel on the first day of dental school at the University of Toronto in September of 1989 — yes, in the 80's. Our class was the first class of 64 students, reduced from larger previous classes of 104 students. We didn't know it at the time, but our class of 1993 was a very special class. A class of select terrific people lucky enough and motivated to want to become dentists. Our class had a strong alpha omega presence as a third of the class was Jewish. Our classmates formed a tight group of friends that basically grew up together; we dated, all got married, had our children together, and started our practices at the same time. We worked hard, played hard, and all watched our dreams come true. We are all very fortunate to have come up in this environment.

Let me tell you a little about Laurel, so you may understand the type of person she is. Laurel was born and raised in Toronto and attended Leo Baeck Day School the first year it opened, along with my wife Jill. Laurel attended Woodland Senior Public School in Thornhill for middle school and then went on to graduate from Thornlea Secondary School. Laurel spent her summers at camp B'nai Brith, a camp in the U.S. called Goldman Union Camp Institute and, finally, at Camp Walden. She had many summer roles, including being a CIT, swim staff, and her many years of unit head positions. Laurel grew up very involved with the Jewish community as well, with her mother being a founding member of Temple Har Zion. Working numerous jobs, between valeting cars and working at shoe stores and later at Roots, even after starting dental school, instilled in Laurel a commitment to hard work and social responsibility. Even as a teenager, Laurel was involved in planning and organizing and giving back to her community with fundraising and charitable initiatives

including her work developing a high school fashion show.

Laurel went on to study at the University of Western Ontario to earn her Bachelor of Science in Biology and then at the University of Toronto for Dentistry from 1989-1993. Laurel was very active in Pi chapter of Alpha Omega during dental school. She was the social chair for our dental school class and was in charge of creating our Friday night TGIF gathering as well as all social programming. Memories of attending an AO convention in Detroit in 1990 are strong in my mind. Laurel went on to a general practice residency at Toronto Western Hospital, before entering into private practice.

At the age of 23, Laurel was so fortunate to go on a blind date with Danny. I remember studying with her in the dental school library before the pickup. Oh where has the time gone! Laurel and Danny have created an amazing family with four very successful and intelligent sons. Zach, Brandon, Sammy and Jonah are all very proud of their mom and she has a wonderful and close relationship with her boys. Together the Fleisher family 6 pack have flourished. Having four boys gave Laurel a whole new chapter of projects and involvement to keep her even busier!!

Laurel continued her involvement in AO after graduation by running a myriad of programs over the years. She has been on the executive every year since graduation in 1993. She was the AO glue that continued to bring our dental school friends together participating in all the programs that she ran. Chanukah parties, picnics, bowling nights, Grand balls, skating nights, and bingo nights. Laurel helped run and refine the Big Sibling program and conceived and started the AO Revival program in the fall of 2008. AO Revival is a program designed to encourage and engage younger members. She put together a dynamic committee of younger members, two of which are past AO chapter presidents, and developed new ways to keep AO relevant. AO Revival runs at least five programs a year including cooking classes, a speaker series, fitness classes, and even a flower arranging class. All AO Revival programs are subsidized but are also fundraisers with profits going to local dental related charities. All our classmates (as well as most other Toronto alumni chapter members) knew they would get calls from Laurel imploring us to attend these wonderful events, and we could never say no. We were all the better for it!!

Laurel's community involvement did not stop with Alpha Omega. While working part time in dentistry, raising a large family, and being an amazing partner to Danny, Laurel also somehow found the time to be involved with Venture Sinai at Sinai Health Foundation, be a board member for Jacob's Ladder, and run the Pages Book club since 1995. She also planned events for the Gerry and Nancy Pencer Brain Trust and ran the UCC Prep Parents' Organization for three years.

Due to Laurel's magic of enthusiasm and commitment, you cannot say no to her. If she can take on 15 things at once and do it with good intentions and a smile, how can you say no? This is why Laurel is so successful in everything she touches. She wears her heart on her sleeve and is never afraid to tell you what she thinks and what is best for you! By the way, she is always right...!

From the minute I met Laurel, I was amazed by her energy, enthusiasm and involvement. This is why Laurel is so great at what she does. The world needs more people like Laurel.
